Navigating biomarker testing

Guidance on what to ask your doctor at each stage of the testing process for people with lung cancer

If you are reading this brochure, it means you want to know more about biomarker testing. Perhaps you are due to have a biomarker test, but you are unsure of what that means for you. Maybe you haven't been offered a biomarker test yet but have a lot of questions.

Having questions is normal. This brochure will guide you through questions you can ask your doctor at each stage of the testing process – right from the first conversation through to receiving your results.

Receiving biomarker test results

For what reasons may my test results take longer to arrive than expected?

How will I be informed of the results?

Can I start treatment in the meantime?

What happens if my test result is inconclusive?

How could test results affect my treatment plan?

Will I need additional testing?

Decision-making using biomarker test results

What kind of information will the test results give me?

Can I be involved in deciding which treatment I receive?

Can I join a clinical trial?

Who should I discuss my test results with?

Can any genetic mutations/biomarkers picked up in the test be passed on to my family?

Where can you get tested for biomarkers?

Contact your doctor if you are interested in testing and they can advise you on the next steps.
